Dear Congressman Kildee and Congresswoman DeLauro:

On behalf of the millions of children and families served by afterschool programs across the country, we are writing to thank you for introducing the Afterschool for America's Children Act. The undersigned organizations support this important legislation that strengthens the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Community Learning Centers (21<sup>st</sup> CCLC) initiative—providing the next generation of before-school, afterschool and summer learning programs that keep young people safe, inspire them to learn and support working families. Thank you for your leadership in making quality, affordable afterschool programs available to all the children and youth that need them.

For more than ten years the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Community Learning Center initiative has helped millions of children to become engaged in their academic studies, while sparking new interests in a wide variety of topics from the sciences to theater. Building on past accomplishments and serving as a companion bill to the bipartisan Afterschool for America's Children Act in the Senate, your legislation supports the innovative advances occurring in before-school, afterschool and summer learning programs, meeting a host of new challenges and re-engaging children in their education and future.

Authorized in Title IV of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), the 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC initiative provides students attending high-poverty schools with academic enrichment activities; a broad array of additional services designed to reinforce and complement the regular academic program, such as: hands on experiments to excite children about science, technology, engineering and math, access to physical activity, drug and violence prevention programs, counseling programs, art, music, opportunities to be creative and technology education programs; as well as literacy and related educational development services to the families of children who are served in the program. In addition, afterschool programs provide an infrastructure to bring in other resources to our children including access to mentors, tutors, snacks and meals, and in some places medical, dental and mental health programs. Your legislation will enhance the quality of these programs; better emphasize science, technology, engineering and math (STEM), twenty first century skills, and physical activity and nutrition education; improve the manner in which the program is evaluated; and strengthen the school-community partnerships that are the hallmark of quality afterschool and summer learning programs.

Quality 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC programs result from collaborations between schools and community-based organizations and provide hands-on, experiential learning opportunities that align with lessons taught during the school-day. Evaluations and teacher reports have revealed positive results in behavior and academic achievement for students who regularly attend 21st CCLCs: students who attend 21st CCLC programs more regularly are more likely to improve their grades, test scores and

overall academic behavior (Learning Point Associates, 2007). There are now over 4,500 grants funding afterschool programs serving over 1.5 million children and youth in over 11,000 school-based and community-based centers across the country. The parents of 18 million students would place their children in an afterschool program if one were available and accessible.

Our groups are proud to endorse this legislation. Thank you again for championing our children, our youth and our families. Afterschool programs offer an effective and affordable way of helping young people realize their full potential. We look forward to working with you in the future to translate our common vision of access to high quality afterschool opportunities for all into a reality.
