Dear Chairman Cole and Ranking Member DeLauro; and Chairman Blunt and Ranking Member Murray:

Thank you for your strong leadership on education and support for afterschool and summer learning. America's families work hard to provide for their children and knowing that you have their back counts more than you know. It is on their behalf that we write today and seek your support for a \$1.3 billion funding level for the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Community Learning Centers (21<sup>st</sup> CCLC) in the fiscal year 2017 Labor, Health and Human Services, Education and Related Agencies appropriations bill -- an increase of about \$130 million over FY2016 funding. At this level we will be able to sustain quality programming for 1.6 million children and extend opportunities to an additional 140,000 children who are currently waiting for access.

The 21 CCLC works as Congress intended: it provides students in grades K-12 with enrichment and academic support through afterschool and summer learning to help them be successful in school and life. It also engages communities: the federal dollars are supported by additional investments in afterschool programs from cities, states, businesses, museums, libraries and other local partners. Between 2006 and 2010, partner organizations contributed more than \$1 billion to support 21st CCLC programs.

There is a growing body of evidence that proves that afterschool and summer learning programs are effective. Recent evaluations have shown that students who participate in these programs are less likely to be involved in crime, use drugs or alcohol or engage in other risky behavior. They improve their grades, attend school more regularly and report higher aspirations regarding finishing school and going to college. As well, these programs expose students to opportunities in science, technology, engineering and math; provide physical activity and healthy eating; and complement and enhance the work they do in the classroom. For all these reasons, current demand far exceeds availability. In fact, according to the 2014 America After 3PM report 9.7 million low-income children have parents who would like to enroll their child in an afterschool program if one were affordable or accessible.

We understand the fiscal constraints you face. We also know that you don't always hear from those on the ground who are utilizing federal programs like the 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC about how your leadership is making a difference in keeping our young people safe and heading down the right path to success in their own lives, for their communities, and ultimately for the health of the nation. But don't take our word for it;

we invite you to visit us in your home states and districts so that you can see firsthand how these dollars are benefitting your constituents.
