CONGRESS INCREASES AFTERSCHOOL FUNDING IN 2010

America's children and families received good news on December 13 when the United States Senate voted 57 to 35 to approve the Fiscal Year 2010 Consolidated Appropriations Conference Report, which includes a \$35 million increase for the 21st Century Community Learning Centers (21st CCLC) afterschool initiative. With this increase, the total funding for 21st CCLCs will be \$1.166 billion in fiscal year 2010. President Obama is expected to sign the bill into law this week.

"We join parents, educators and afterschool supporters nationwide in applauding Congress for increasing afterschool funding by \$35 million next year," said Afterschool Alliance Executive Director Jodi Grant. "This appropriation is especially good news in these times of tight budgets, and demonstrates that lawmakers recognize that afterschool programs are essential. Because of this increase, more children and families will get the support they urgently need during these tough times."

The Conference Committee recognized the positive benefits of afterschool, noting that "Research shows that when students have a place to go after school where they can study and be supervised by an adult, not only are they less likely to get into trouble, they also get a better education."

Afterschool leaders are commending Chairman David Obey (D-WI) and Ranking Member Todd Tiahrt (R-KS) of the House Appropriations Labor, Health and Human Services, Education and Related Agencies Volume 10, Issue 14, December 22, 2009

Subcommittee – as well as Chairman Tom Harkin (D-IA) and Ranking Member Thad Cochran (R-MS) of the Senate Appropriations Labor, Health and Human Services, Education and Related Agencies Subcommittee – for their leadership. The new funds will help 35,000 more children access quality afterschool programs.

However, despite the increase in afterschool funding, millions of children and youth will have no safe, supervised activities available to them after the school day ends. A survey of afterschool program leaders conducted this spring by the Afterschool Alliance found that some programs that were struggling before the recession are closing their doors, and many others are being forced to reduce the number of children they serve, cut hours and staff, and provide many fewer activities and supports for students who are in greater need than ever.

More recently, *America After 3PM*, a survey of nearly 30,000 households, sponsored by the JCPenney Afterschool Fund for the Afterschool Alliance, found that 26 percent of America's children (15.1 million kids) are on their own in the afternoons – an increase of 800,000 since 2004. The parents of 18 million kids say they would enroll their children <u>if</u> afterschool programs were available.

"Unfortunately, even with this increase, 21st CCLC funding is still far below the \$2.5 billion authorized several years ago, and millions of children have no place to go after school where they will be safe, supervised, and have opportunities to learn and develop their skills and talents," Grant added. "We fully recognize that these are difficult budget times, and congratulate Congress for *Congress continued on page eight...*

COMING UP TALLER AWARDS

Nineteen afterschool and humanities programs were honored by the President's Committee on the Arts and the Humanities (PCAH) as recipients of the 2009 "Coming Up Taller" awards. First Lady Michelle Obama, who serves as honorary chair of the Committee, presented the awards at a White House ceremony on November 4. Begun in 1998, the annual awards bring national recognition to programs that foster creativity in youth, while providing learning opportunities and giving back to their communities.

"Each of your programs is using achievement in the arts as a bridge to achievement in life," Mrs. Obama said. "You ask our young people to dream, and you give them the tools to fulfill those dreams. You affirm that their contributions are valuable, and their success matters to all of us. You help them see beyond the circumstances of their lives to the world of possibility that awaits them. And for that, we honor you."

Fifteen of the programs that were honored are based in the United States. They include <u>Higher Achievement</u>, a Washington, D.C. program that delivers year-round rigorous programming to provide enrichment opportunities to disadvantaged middle school students.

The Old Brick Playhouse from rural West Virginia was honored as well. It gives upand-coming actors the chance to increase their self esteem and literacy skills by learning plays and musical comedies, and performing them in the community.

Other honorees were <u>The Harmony</u> <u>Project</u> in Los Angeles, which gives lowincome youth who would otherwise not have these opportunities rigorous music instruction and ensemble performance experience; <u>Sitar</u> <u>Arts Center</u> in Washington, D.C., which offers visual and performing arts classes; the <u>Keshet Dance Company</u>'s Outreach Program, which offers incarcerated youth at the New Mexico state juvenile detention center a chance to learn conflict resolution, literacy and math through dance; and Citywide Poets, which fosters writing skills at more than 50 high schools in Detroit by giving teenagers the chance to publish magazines, perform their work in the community, and partner with professional writers.

Other winners are based in Mexico, China and Egypt.

"These young people don't just become accomplished singers and painters and authors. They also become better students, they become better leaders, and they become better citizens, enriching not just themselves but their communities, teaching younger children the skills that they've learned, beautifying neighborhoods with murals, and lifting their communities with their performances," Mrs. Obama said.

The "Coming Up Taller" award includes a \$10,000 grant and an individualized plaque honoring the program's contribution to children around the world. Thirty-five semi-finalists also receive a certificate of recognition.

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IN THE NEWS...

California – When the SkyLife Aeromedical Transportation helicopter landed on the Golden West High School football field, ten teenagers swarmed around the crew, asking questions and snapping pictures with their cell phones. The teens are part of a unique afterschool program, Pro-Youth/HEART, which introduces them to the field of medicine, reports the Visalia Times-Delta. Teacher Dave Rodgers started the program with a 21^{st} Century grant, which helps students earn a license in CPR and first aid. "The main reason I put this course together was to expose these kids to something they don't get to see except on TV," Rodgers said. "They get to go on field trips and learn about a field that is growing."

Illinois – Youth at the GUM Park afterschool program in Decatur have turned into Santa's little helpers, making stockings to send to active military duty personnel as part of "Operation Santa." The children, as young as five years old, cut and sew the stockings on the program's sewing machines with the help of volunteers from the Decatur Quilters Guild, the Herald & Review reports. GUM Park, along with the Guild and the Girl Scouts of Central Illinois, have helped the organization make more than 5,000 stockings. "The older kids help the younger kids out," GUM Park Director Bev Stern said. "When they aren't sewing, they're writing letters." Indiana – Governor Mitch Daniels visited the Fairfield Avenue Boys & Girls Club in Fort Wayne in the fall to personally judge the progress of his "Mitch's Kids" initiative. Implemented five years ago, the program aims to raise reading and math scores of lowincome youth across the state. Students who qualify for the free program participate in 30 homework and tutoring sessions, and lectures that orient them to possible careers. It doesn't take a pop quiz from the Governor to confirm that the program is working; reading-fluency scores of its children have increased by an average of 65 percent, and math-fluency by 64.5 percent, Daniels told the Fort Wayne Journal Gazette.

Michigan – First-graders at Taft and Buchanan Elementary Schools won't be performing the music they're learning on a stage; they'll perform it in the classroom. They are part of an innovative program at the Girls Choral Academy that teaches music as a language, increasing the brain's ability to form sequences and patterns, thereby boosting math and reading abilities. Launched this fall, students meet after school twice a week. Their performance on assessment tests will be measured against youth who are not in the program through the two-year pilot program, the *Grand Rapid Press* reports.

Missouri – The Center for Survivors of Torture and War Trauma in St. Louis is expanding its afterschool program to focus on the unique needs of teenage refugees who have come to the United States. Funded by a federal grant, the program aims to help teenagers as they assimilate to American culture and education, and deter them from joining gangs. Mentors will provide homework help and guidance, and programs will be offered on anger management, goal setting and the dangers of substance abuse, the St. Louis Post-Dispatch reports. Pennsylvania – Children on the streets of Pittsburgh are being stopped by police officers, but not for misbehaving - they're "Caught Being Good." The program from the United Way of Allegheny County and the Youth Futures Commission awards children for serving their communities, being on time, going to school, getting good grades, and checking out books from the library, the Pittsburgh Tribune Review reports. Participants can be recognized for good behavior in school, in afterschool programs, or on the streets. They wear cards identifying them as part of the program, and earn points redeemable for prizes for each instance of good behavior.



ACTIONS SPEAK LOUDEST

What can America do to leave the world a better place for the next generation? What can we take action on today to ensure that youth will be better off tomorrow? Thirtyfive celebrities, authors and experts have tackled what they believe are the most important issues facing America's youth in a powerful new book, *Actions Speak Loudest*.

Education is a key topic, and the focus ranges from access to higher education, to financial literacy, to school wellness. Afterschool Alliance Board Chair Terry Peterson collaborated with former Education Secretary Richard Riley for an essay about high school graduation rates. Other contributors include Queen Noor of Jordan, celebrity chef and talk show host Rachel Ray, U.S. Senator Tom Harkin (D-IA), entrepreneur Dave Eggers, soccer player Mia Hamm, and political commentator Juan Williams.

Each of the book's 32 essays includes a list of ways to take action on the issue it addresses, which range from climate change to childhood obesity. Congress continued from page one... increasing America's investment in afterschool programs. We urge President Obama to include a further increase for afterschool programs in his next budget, so more children will be safe and supervised after the school day ends."

The spending bill also included funding for the Child Care and Development Block Grant program, the Corporation for National and Community Service's VISTA and Americorps programs, full service community schools, and several other funding streams that benefit afterschool programs.
