Nation Needs More Afterschool Programs for Older Youth

Briefing Will Explore How Afterschool Partnerships Support Student Success

What happens to older youth when they have nowhere to go after the school bell rings? From 3 to 6 PM, while the juvenile crime rate is tripling, youth in afterschool programs are safe, supervised and getting an academic boost. But just 500,000 of the 8.4 million students in afterschool programs are in grades 9 - 12, and only five percent of 21st Century Community Learning Centers exclusively target high school students. A household survey released by the Afterschool Alliance last fall, sponsored by the JCPenney Afterschool Fund, found that almost four million high school students would participate in afterschool programs if they were available.

To explore how afterschool programs can better serve older youth, the Afterschool Alliance will hold a congressional briefing on before school, afterschool and summer programs for older youth. The event is being held in conjunction with Senators Blanche Lincoln and Evan Bayh at:

Senators Lincoln and Bayh both co-sponsor the ASPIRE Act, which would provide a funding stream for afterschool programs serving older youth. Quality afterschool programs aimed at this age group focus on academics and can include credit recovery or attainment as well as hands-on learning opportunities such as internships and apprenticeships that keep students engaged in school and help them develop skills for the workforce.
