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As Congress Considers Eliminating Crucial Federal Afterschool Funding, Briefing Will Examine Data on Afterschool Programs, How They Help Children and Youth Succeed in School and in Life

For more than a decade, 21^{st} Century Community Learning Centers (21^{st} CCLC) have played a critical role in providing young people with hands-on and engaging learning experiences that help them succeed in school and in life. Next week, the Senate Afterschool Caucus will host a briefing on the need for continued support for the 21^{st} CCLC initiative. The Senate Health Education Labor and Pensions (HELP) Committee is scheduled to mark up its draft Elementary and Secondary Education Act reauthorization bill, which proposes to eliminate 21st CCLC funding, in the coming weeks.

Experts will discuss <u>America After 3PM</u>, the Afterschool Alliance's recent nationwide survey of 30,000 households that found 10.2 million children participate in afterschool programs, but the parents of 19.4 million children would enroll their child in a program, if one were available. Demand for afterschool programs is especially high among low-income, African American and Hispanic families.
