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Afterschool Alliance Names Libby Afterschool Program Coordinator One of Just 20 'Afterschool Ambassadors' from Across Nation

Kaide Dodson Will Work in Montana and Nationally to Expand Afterschool

Washington, D.C. – The [Afterschool Alliance today announced](#) that Kaide Dodson, 21st Century Community Learning Centers Program Coordinator in Libby, Montana has been selected to serve as a 2011-2012 Afterschool Ambassador. She is one of just 20 local leaders from 17 states chosen for the honor this year. Each Ambassador will continue directing or supporting a local afterschool program while also serving a one-year Afterschool Ambassador term organizing public events, communicating with policy makers, and building support for afterschool programs.

“Quality afterschool programs are invaluable to students, families and communities,” said Afterschool Alliance Executive Director Jodi Grant. “These programs keep kids safe, help working families and inspire students to learn. But in Washington, D.C. and all across the country, the afterschool programs that families rely on are being threatened by budget cuts and efforts to divert afterschool funds to other programs. We need to spread the word about the urgent need to make opportunities to attend afterschool programs available to all children who need them. Kaide will bring great skill and energy to that work in her role as an Afterschool Ambassador. I look forward to working with her to build even stronger support for afterschool programs among parents, business and community leaders, lawmakers and others.”

“I am delighted to have this chance to help increase support for afterschool programs, which give students opportunities to explore their interests and give parents the security that comes with knowing that their children are safe and supervised, with engaging, educational activities after the school day ends,” said Dodson. “Afterschool programs are critical to students’ success in school, to families trying to surviving in this recession, and to America’s workforce in the future. We need to strengthen the afterschool programs we have and ensure that there is a program for every child who needs one.”

Dodson has been with the Libby Afterschool Program for more than five years. During this time she developed and enhanced an afterschool program for students that primarily focuses on increasing achievement and promoting successful career opportunities. “We live in an isolated, rural area with high poverty, and I know our afterschool program enriches the lives of many children with valuable afterschool activities,” Dodson added. The high school afterschool program has successfully served more than 92 percent of the high school student population

through programs that are relevant and structured to their current and future needs through meaningful adult and peer relationships.

The high school afterschool program offers homework help, academic credit recovery and supplemental educational services. Throughout the school year, career educational opportunities are offered, including FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) Night for Families; career/college planning; science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) opportunities; career day; and more. Enrichment activities for student engagement, such as STEP, geocaching, *Lights On Afterschool* disc golf, guitar and musical instruction, DUI and drug prevention programs, bullying and team-building workshops, community service learning projects, mentoring, and parental involvement activities are offered on a monthly basis to students, parents, and the community.

Each Ambassador will organize a major event for *Lights On Afterschool*, the Afterschool Alliance's 12th annual national rally for afterschool, to be held on October 20 this year. Last year, a million people participated in some 7,500 *Lights On Afterschool* events across the United States and at U.S. military bases worldwide. Afterschool programs are under intense pressure this year, with the Senate considering legislation that would divert some of the already limited afterschool funds to other programs.
