Burroughs Wellcome Fund Program Officer Honored in Nation's Capital as a Powerful and Effective Champion for Afterschool and Youth

*Educators, Parents, Afterschool Leaders Come Together to
Urge Congress to Increase Funding for Afterschool Programs*

WASHINGTON, D.C. – The Afterschool Alliance today honored Carr Thompson, Senior Program Officer of Burroughs Wellcome Fund, for her support for afterschool programs. Thompson was named a State Afterschool Champion at the “Breakfast of Champions,” a gala event in Washington, D.C. featuring Members of Congress and national afterschool champions. Thompson has been a leader in ensuring access to afterschool programs for low-income children. She was one of 18 state champions from around the country honored at the Breakfast for supporting and working on behalf of afterschool programs and the children and families who benefit from quality programs. The North Carolina Center for Afterschool Programs nominated her for the honor.

As Senior Program Officer of Burroughs Wellcome Fund, Thompson has supported communities across North Carolina through programs such as the Student Science Enrichment Program. Thompson has been a long-time board member, leader, and funder of both the North Carolina Center for Afterschool Programs (NC CAP) and NC CAP’s fiscal agent, the Public School Forum of North Carolina. Thompson serves on and has chaired several additional boards including the STEM Funders Network, North Carolina Network of Grantmakers, North Carolina School of Science and Mathematics, North Carolina Central University Foundation, and the National Science Resources Center in Washington. Thompson also helped build key relationships with policymakers in North Carolina including legislators, State Board of Education members, and the foundation community through the North Carolina Institute for Education Policymakers.

“Carr Thompson’s leadership has made a tremendous difference in the lives of children and youth across North Carolina” said Jamie Knowles-Griffiths, Director of the North Carolina Center for Afterschool Programs. “Through her work with the North Carolina Center for Afterschool Programs, she has been a key voice in shaping policy decisions and sharing the importance of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) education in informal learning environments.”

The “Breakfast of Champions” is part of the 12th annual *Afterschool for All Challenge*, sponsored by the Afterschool Alliance, which brings together hundreds of educators, parents, afterschool leaders and advocates from around the country for a series of events and meetings with Members of Congress. Following the Breakfast, participants fanned out across Capitol Hill to talk to their senators and representatives about the importance of afterschool programs to children, families and communities. This year, the Alliance is also encouraging advocates for afterschool to participate in the *Challenge* at home by calling or visiting Congressional district offices to urge their representatives in Congress to increase funding for the 21st Century Community Learning Centers and the Child Care Development Fund.

“There’s no question that afterschool programs are a lifeline for working parents, give our children and youth a safe place to be and inspire academic and social/emotional learning,” said Afterschool Alliance Executive Director Jodi Grant. “But they also do much more. They expose kids to possible careers in the sciences or the arts, teach them the value of community service, and provide them with mentors, meals, physical activity and so much more. The people we honor as champions today are helping to educate, support and guide the young people who will be our future leaders.”

In addition to the 18 State Champions, the Afterschool Alliance honored John Galvin, Assistant Principal of New York's I.S. 318 in Brooklyn, as a national Afterschool Champion at the Breakfast. A veteran educator who has devoted 20 years to the students of I.S. 318, Galvin is also a coach for the school's afterschool chess program. The school's chess team has won more national championships than any other junior high chess team in the nation and is the subject of the recent, critically acclaimed documentary "Brooklyn Castle."
